I'm not sure just in that feeling—Where are the wild things I am, let's say, a terrifying movie. It is a film in which the arts are torn, the owls are shot from the sky (and we should agree with this, I think) and a child lives under the constant threat of being eaten by monsters. I was 11 years old, when wild things I was released a decade ago, and practically everything that scared me. She still does, but after reviewing, what frightened me above all was the palpable sense of loneliness that permeates the whole film.
