Free Chess is only available on Windows desktops, and is not available on phones or tablets.Is there a better alternative?There are many alternatives that offer more features and accessibility to players around the world. How to Play Chess Chess is a game for all, and simpler than you may think. You can learn the chess rules here! Select to play as either the black or white chess pieces from the chess setup — white always moves first. The first move is performed by the Pawn or the Knight. Knights are the only pieces allowed to jump over others in the whole chess set and do so by moving out two squares and across one on the chess board. In chess, the pawn is free to move forward two squares on the opening move, however, it can only progress one square forward at a time after that. Also, it can only attack in a forward, diagonal direction. After this opening to the chess game, the objective is to get the rest of your chess pieces out to attack the opponent's King, while simultaneously protecting your own. The other pieces are free to move across the chess set in the following ways: Bishops can move in any diagonal direction in an unlimited number of available chess board spaces. Rooks can do the same, but in any non-diagonal direction on the chess board. In chess, Queens (your most valuable piece in chess) can move in any direction in an unlimited number of available spaces. Kings can move in any direction, however, only one square at a time on the chess board. In chess, once the King is threatened, it is placed in "check." The player with the King in danger must use the next move to either move it on the chess board, attack the threatening chess pieces, or block it to get out of "check." Failure to do so could signal the end of the chess game with the King being placed in "checkmate," meaning that it is impossible to avoid an attack on the King and the player who places the King in this position wins the game of chess online. Fun Facts about Chess - The longest a chess game could possibly be is 5,949 moves. - The first chess board setup with light and dark alternating squares was used in Europe in 1090. - In Chess, the term "Checkmate" derives from the Persian phrase "Shah Mat", meaning "the King is dead". - It is estimated that over 600 million people play chess online and around the world. - Magnus Carlsen of Norway is the current world chess champion. You can then begin adding the books you want to your Audible Wish List. Like Amazon Wish Lists, there's no limit on the number of items you can gather, although unlike Amazon, you can have only one list on Audible. Your Audible Wish List is separate from the Amazon wish lists. You're able to place the same title on both sites, however. Amazon prevents you from purchasing a book you already have in your Audible library. While browsing a book's details, you'll see the price listed alongside the cost to purchase with credits. Although the cost to purchase books with a credit card can differ, you can get just about any book with one credit. To buy a book on the Audible website: When you're browsing a list, select Add to Cart next to one or more books that you want. Alternatively, if you're looking at a book's detail, you can select Buy Now for \$xx.xx, which will take you directly to payment for just that book. Select the cart at the top of the page to see the books you've added. In the cart, if you have credits available, Audible uses them first to cover your purchase. If they aren't enough, you'll see the subtotal required to buy the rest of your items. You can choose which books use credits and which you'll pay for with cash. Be sure to use your credits on the most expensive books first. Select Proceed to Checkout to make your purchase. Review your order on the next page. Make sure everything is correct and select Complete Purchase or select Edit Items to go back and make changes. After you finish buying your new book(s), you land on a page confirming your success. Your new books are available for download in your Library. Purchasing books using the Audible app is just as easy as using the website, and it follows similar steps. These steps apply to the Audible app for Windows, Android, and iOS. Select a book from either the store or your Wish List and tap Buy Now for \$xx.xx to buy the book individually, as there is no cart in the app. Alternately, tap "x" Credit(s) available to purchase using any credits you might have. This option is greyed out if you don't have any credits. Select Confirm Purchase in the screen that pops up. When your purchase goes through, you see a confirmation screen. On the Audible Android and iOS app, tap View in Library to jump to the book in your Library, where you can download it. The Windows version doesn't have this option. Buying books in Audible format through the Amazon website is included as one of the format options, alongside others, such as hardback, paperback, and Kindle. Purchasing this way works just like it does for other formats, including the cart process and confirmation. The only difference is the book appears in your Audible Library. Once your purchase is complete, the items appear in your Library. From the Audible website, you can stream your books, which start playing immediately. However, on mobile devices, it's much better to download them. There are two sections to the Library on Windows, iOS, and Android devices: Cloud: a collection of all the things you've purchased in the past Device: contains only the items you've downloaded locally Make sure you're connected to a Wi-Fi network when downloading books unless you have a high-speed, unlimited data plan. Some books, depending on their length, can be 1 GB in size and can make a big impact on your data cap. On all platforms, the books you haven't yet downloaded appear with a download icon in the corner. To download them: Select the three horizontal dots icon next to your desired book. Select Download. The book starts to download. You can start listening to it as it downloads, but don't disconnect from the broadband network yet. Wait until the progress spinner indicates your download is done. If you already own a book for your Kindle, you can add the audible narration. From Amazon.com, go to Account & Lists > Your content and devices > Content. If you've never really studied the opening before, Back to Basics: Openings is the perfect place to start. This book covers the main lines and critical variations of every opening system under the sun but never overwhelms the player with too much knowledge. It's a great way to quickly learn just the basics about any opening system - and for players rated under 1500 or so, that's about all that needs to be learned. Larry Kaufman's repertoire book is a great addition to the library of any serious chess player. Half of the book is devoted to a White repertoire (he recommends 1. d4, though there are a couple lines that transpose to 1. e4 lines, so e4 players can get at least something out of the book), while the reverse half focuses on Black responses to various White systems. All lines are both computers checked and referenced with grandmaster play, making them both sound and practical. If you want a solid opening repertoire that will always get you to a decent position (or better), then this is the book for you. Looking for sidelines that will surprise your opponents and lead to some spectacular wins? Secrets of Opening Surprises has long been one of my favorite columns in New In Chess, and the collections of articles they occasionally publish as books in the SOS series are a great way to quickly find a line or two you can incorporate into your repertoire. I especially like these lines for players who play with the same opponents over and over again in a club setting, as many opponents will assume you'll always play the same lines - and bust out one of these very dangerous (if not always entirely sound) SOS lines can lead to an easy win in an important game. This series is similar to the Back to Basics book recommended above, but it's much more in-depth (and comes in a set of four volumes). If you want a reference that both covers all of the important variations in every relevant opening system while also giving you information on the plans and strategies associated with each opening (along with the requisite example games), the Chess Opening Essentials books are just what you need. The only book on this list about a specific opening, I've included Dismantling the Sicilian both because it is incredibly complete - it offers thousands of positions to study in individual variations and covers every single line that one might encounter after 1. e4 c5 2. Nf3 - and because it has a place in my heart. As an e4 player, I used this book to bulk up my preparation against the Sicilian, which is the thorn in the side of most who play e4. It produced rather rapid results - not long after studying the lines within, I won my first tournament game against a master in a Scheveningen Sicilian. To be fair, the win didn't come in the opening, but the lines I learned from this book helped me confidently get to a solid middlegame position - and what else can you really ask for in a well-played opening?
